The Right Understanding of Technological Advancement Through Indian Values

In contrast, the virtual world today is increasingly shaped by algorithms that privilege speed over wisdom, attention over awareness, and consumption over contemplation. As digital technologies permeate everyday life, the challenge before us is not technological advancement, but ethical alignment.

Reclaiming values in the virtual world requires conscious human agency. Values such as empathy, responsibility, honesty, and inclusivity cannot be outsourced to machines. When digital platforms amplify hatred, misinformation, or vanity, they depart from dharma. Reclaiming values means restoring accountability—not only through regulation, but through individual ethical restraint and collective cultural maturity.

Education, therefore, must go beyond digital literacy to digital wisdom. Knowing how to use technology is no longer enough; we must learn when to pause, question, and choose differently. The virtual world needs ethical anchors—human judgment, cultural rootedness, and philosophical insight—to prevent technological power from becoming moral emptiness. Ancient wisdom traditions remind us that tools are meant to serve human flourishing, not define it. Whether expressed through ideas of *dharma*, conscience, or human dignity, values give direction to progress. Without them, innovation risks becoming acceleration without purpose. NEP (National Education Policy 2020) enables engagement with the youth in this way through the curriculum.

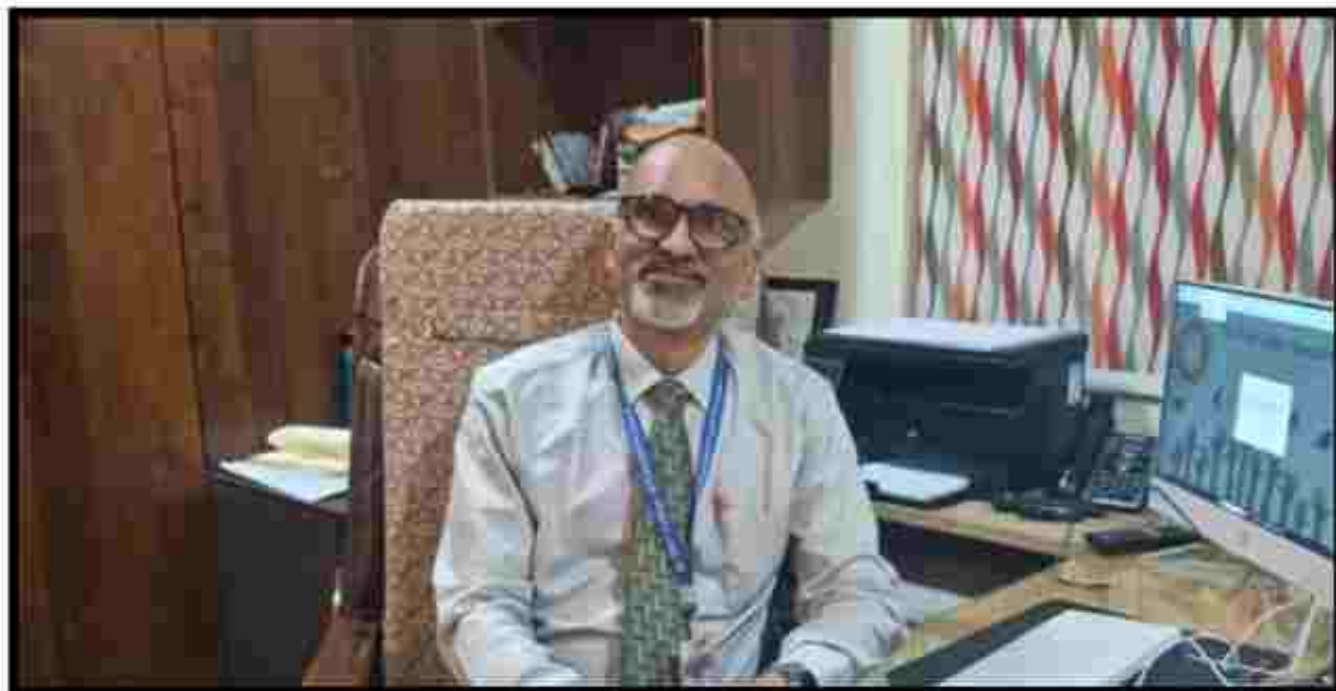

Beyond the Algorithm: Reclaiming Values in the Virtual World

Dear Students,

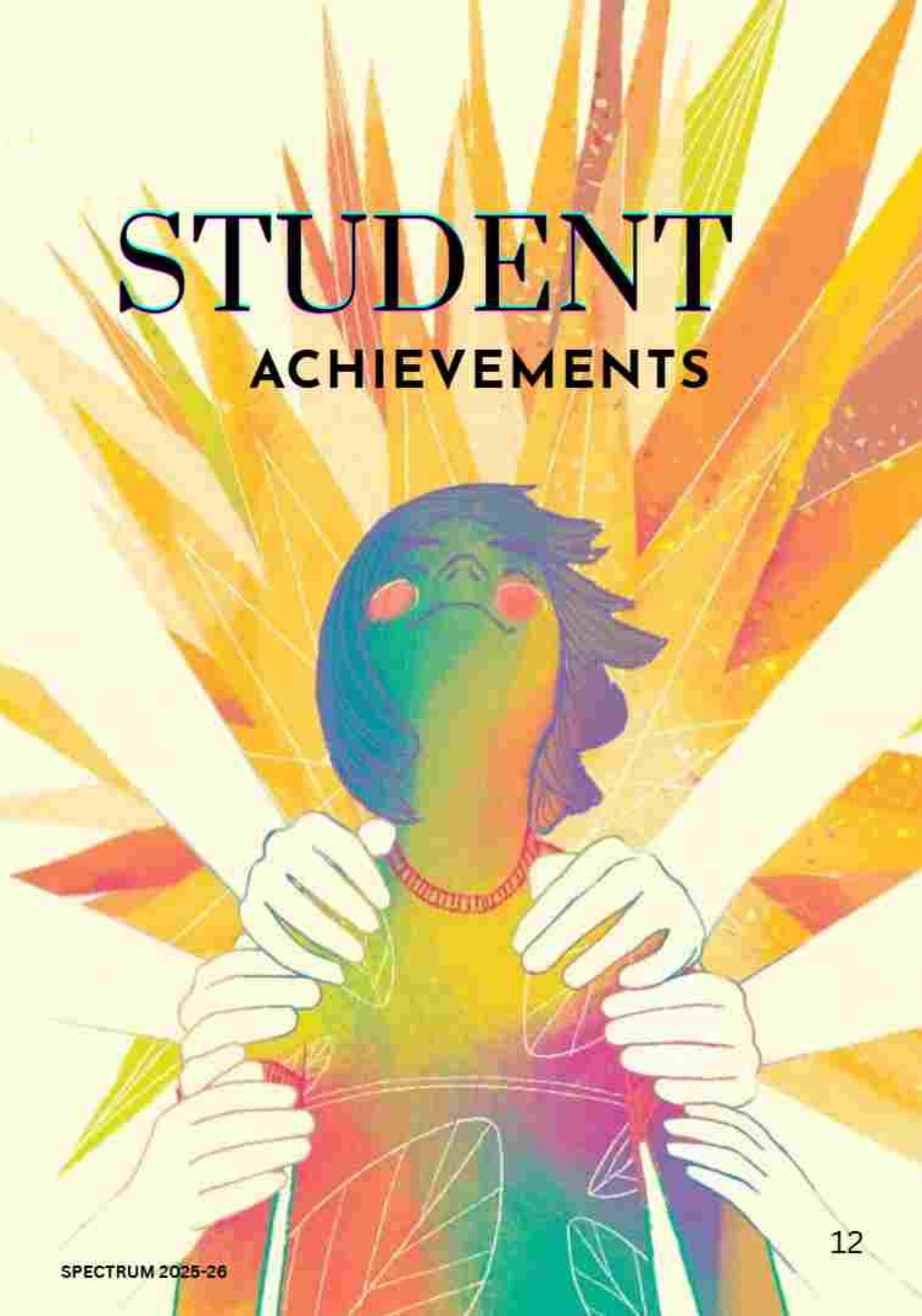

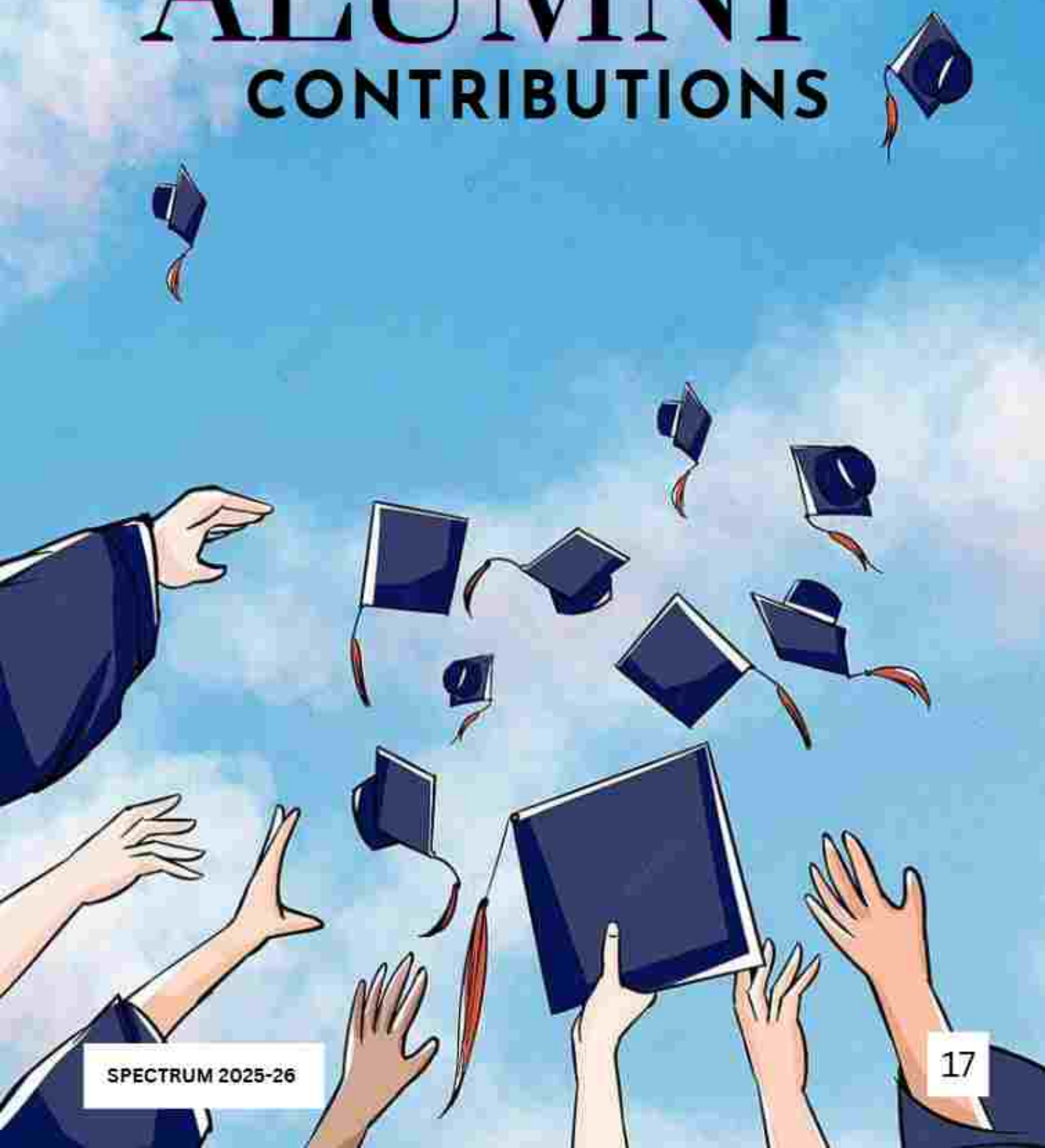

From VR Trails To Mountain Treks

I used to be that person who lived for the outdoors.

Beaches, nature trails, treks - I loved it all. But somewhere between building my career and helping people develop their personal brands, work took over my life. My hand-assembled Ikea desk and my MacBook became my closest companions. I found myself stuck indoors for weeks, convinced I was too busy for actual adventures.

That's when I had a brilliant idea: VR glasses that could transport me to exotic trails while I walked on a treadmill. Ropkund for a Friday morning walk! The Valley of Flowers for a Saturday stroll! It seemed more efficient than wasting weekends on actual treks.

Luckily, I struck up a conversation with my college professor who was about to take a trek. One thing led to another, and I signed up for the trek too. It took thirty years and a mountain called Mrugagad to realise how wrong I'd gotten it.

When I Realised I Was Suffocating In My Own Success

My first trek was in 1995 with the same professor as part of our college NSS squad. Back then, our biggest distraction was a Walkman with tangled headphones. Fast forward three decades, and I was immersed in helping others build their digital presence. Ironic? A personal branding strategist who had lost touch with her own authentic self.

The decision to trek again was desperate. After years of SEO-optimised content and curated feeds, I felt like I was suffocating in ones and zeros.



Two weeks passed before I could muster the courage. My fitness was questionable, my gear squeaky clean, and my virtual Himalayan fantasies hadn't equipped me for actual rocks and dirt. But there we were, 7:30 am, standing at the foot of a fort barely 1750 feet high, but to someone planning to conquer mountains from a treadmill, it looked

One Step At a Time: Rediscovering Presence

The moment I stepped onto the trail, something shifted. My phone had no signal - unlike VR, no pause button or skip to the 'good parts'. Instead, I faced the present moment, placing each step on real earth. What struck me was the human connection. When a lady froze between rocks, paralysed,

we encouraged her. When a child had fever, my professor offered medicine. When an uncle's knees gave out, hands pulled him up. No algorithms determined help. Just humans being human. No VR could replicate the strength of someone's hand pulling you up.

Your Turn: Choosing Virtual or the real world

That day reminded me that no simulation can replicate genuine connection and real compassion. As students entering a world where virtual reality promises to replace actual reality, you have a choice: let simulated experiences substitute for real human connection, or remember that meaningful moments happen where WiFi can't reach.

So I ask you: when will you take off the headset and step outside?



Chalk Lines and Screen Glows: The Quiet Shift in Childhood Play

In a north Indian lane, the night wind brought with it the smell of withering memory as chalked cricket stumps merged into the wall. The lane, which was once resounded with clicking marbles and kite pulling, was now filled with quiet. Rather than the ordinary play, there was soft lighting in windows, bathing children's faces warmly, their smiling and giggling covered by glass and algorithms, as they sat over their phones and tablets.

The shift from physical play to digital entertainment didn't happen overnight. It began with a missed game, a busy road, or a park a little further away. Soon, the most reliable playmate became a screen that never cancelled plans and always had one more level to beat. The pandemic's aftermath brought daily device use into a habit, a frictionless routine that felt safe, close, and endlessly available. It did so, however, in a silent displacement of streets, fields, and front steps.

One mother started tallying up the minutes that her toddler spent on screens, and to her amazement, they amounted to approximately 2.22 hours per day.

That was approximately double the World Health Organisation's recommendation of no more than one hour for children between 2 and 4 years old, and zero for babies.

This imbalance between convenience and care made her ponder when the equilibrium had been lost, and when the light from the screens had begun to obfuscate the loveliness of the setting sun.

In the future, teenagers huddled online far beyond homework, their afternoons telescoped across videos, games, and messages. Research indicated that more than eight in every ten high school students in rural India parts spent more time on recreational screen-based activities than guidelines recommended. The days passed still, yet the distance covered somehow felt impossibly tiny, quantified in scrolls instead of steps.

The vacant field, which was a lively area for outdoor play, was now substituted by the virtual space, leaving behind an unrestrained feeling of isolation and a yearning for the uncomplicated pleasures of the past. School was no exception, as the morning assembly bled into a courtyard that attempted to do many things at once. Even in a nation where approximately four in every five schools claim a playground, that fifth represents millions without a designated area to run, climb, and call their own. Audits of school environments in Delhi have also identified missing crossings, speeding traffic, and few traffic-calming barriers that make "reachable" spaces inaccessible to small legs and anxious minds.

Parents fondly remembered their youth, sharing anecdotes at the chai stall. They concurred that the alleys of childhood seemed wider in the past, with more time, fewer motorcars, and games that didn't require recharging. Most now think children's outdoor spaces have narrowed in comparison to their own. As all memory is faulty, this trend holds true in surveys and streetscape research alike.

Fear first drew a line, first of traffic, strangers, pollution, and the rough-and-tumble unpredictability of public space. The most secure plan was apparently the smallest circle: home. Then came design, with neighbourhoods valuing speed over sidewalks and parking over pocket parks, thinning out the daily invitations to linger, to wander, to play.

The screen then addressed them in perfect sync, providing instant gratification, frictionless friendship, and specially selected challenge. It was the simulation of community without the logistics of coming together, the feeling of competence without skinned knees or walking home miles. What started as a replacement for absent swings and crowded streets eventually became the standard, silently redefining the shape of an afternoon. But the price of this change is rarely considered.

For the youngest, heavier screen use has in Indian and international studies been associated with language and communication delay when it displaces sensitive, face-to-face interaction and the rich mess of free play. Reviews caution that unsupervised, prolonged viewing poses broader development risks, particularly when displacing movement and shared routines that assist children in managing emotions and learning from others.



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In adolescents and young adults, greater daily smartphone use is associated with sleep difficulties, which can turn classrooms into mist and afternoons into restlessness, blurring the distinction between leisure and lag. Cross-sectional research in Indian children illustrates how too much screen watching often goes hand in hand with headaches, eye discomfort, and less exercise, even when the brain denies it.



On one Saturday, a Residents' Welfare Association attempted something small: blocking off a short street adjacent to the school for two hours, drawing a hopscotch square, and setting up cones as temporary wickets. In an instant, kids took back the map with their feet and laughter. That afternoon was a regular occurrence, the cones exchanged for paint and planters and turning the street from cut-through to common area in ways urban-design scholarship has long established as essential to children's everyday activity.

Within one household whose children's screen time dropped to the recommended levels, the dinner table recovered its surface, and the bedrooms their silence when devices remained outside. Led by paediatric guidance to avoid screens in sleep areas and at the table for eating, an uncomplicated family media plan made the rules obvious. The plan was less recreational screen time, no screen time before bed, and co-viewing when feasible, freeing up more space for stories delivered eye to eye.

The schoolyard solution to a healthier relationship with screens is to provide a secure and nurturing environment where kids can be physically active, be social, and be creative. By making such activities the priority and restricting screen time, we can ensure kids develop healthy habits for a lifetime.

A head teacher offered to open the playground late, and parents volunteered to sit watch in turns, turning a rare occurrence into routine. This established a rhythm that put a neighbourhood's metronome ticking again. Most schools already have some sort of play area, so rejuvenating and opening what is already there can be a highly effective lever without new buildings.

India at a crossroads

On one hand, there's the neatness of a screen-formatted childhood, contained and efficient. And on the other, there's the inimitable worth of unstructured park play, learning judgement, forming friendships, and making bodies strong in ways that no app can do. Re-taking the lane, the park, and the pause isn't a battle against technology, but rather a leap of balance away from the algorithm and back to the human-scale routines that serve children well.

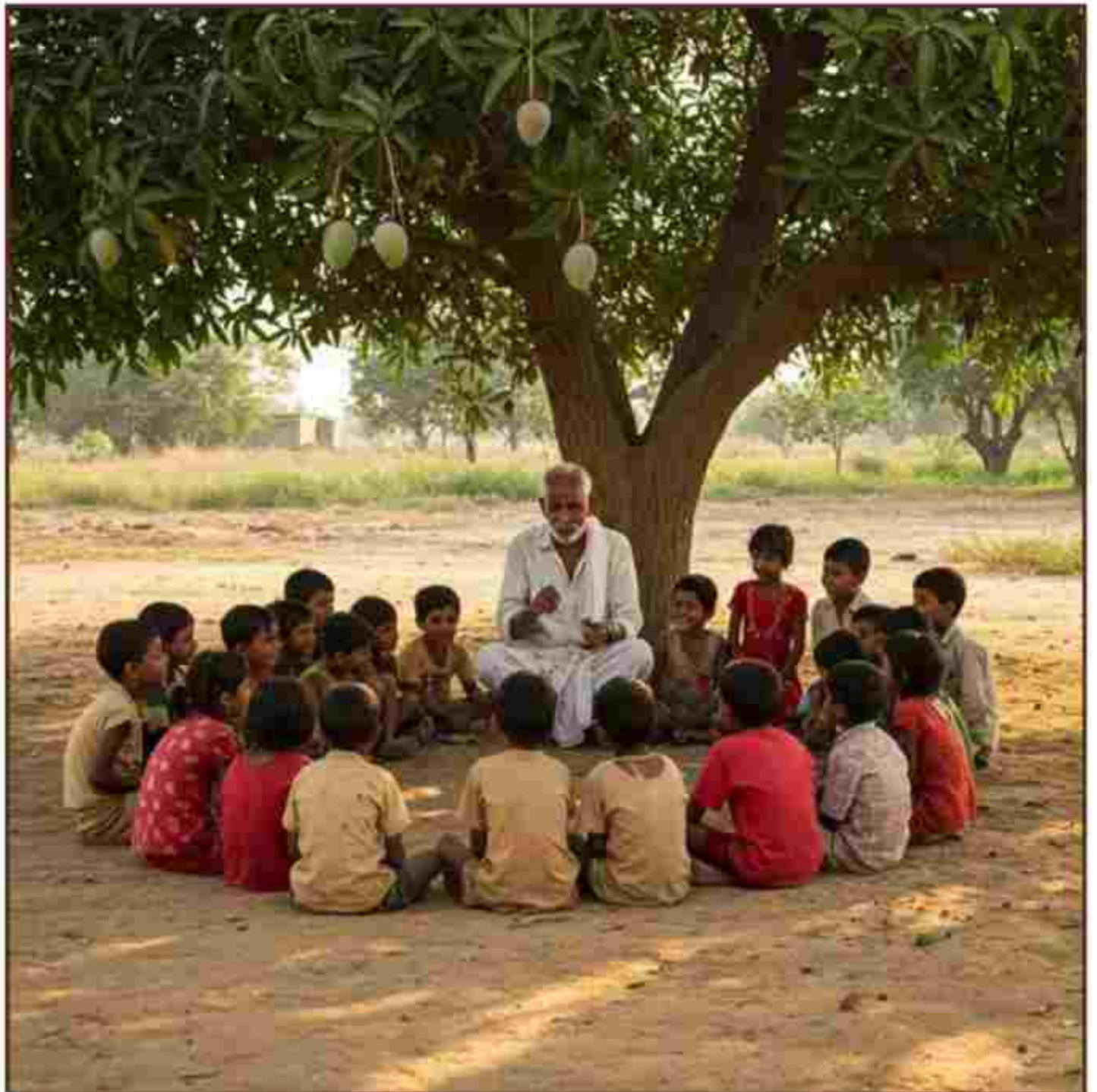


The route back

It won't require grand actions; it will require countless small ones: a peaceful crossing, a pocket park, an open gate, a device left on the shelf, and adults setting the balance they expect to see, day after dull day. Childhood must be pursued, stumbled through, and yelled across because the field still lies in wait where the street meets the sky and the game is on when the first chalk line is drawn.

A quiet kind of promise

A ball is rolled in the dying light to a standstill against a painted curb, and a child points again and again at the vanishing line opting for outdoors simply because it's there, and because someone made it seem probable. That quiet decision is how values come back in a virtual world: not through a prohibition, but through a superior invitation to play.

When we have everything curated for us, like spoon-feeding, we loose connection. What's the point of talking about connections with others when we don't have one with ourselves. You yourself know the perfect song for you. People who really think and take an effort to go beyond the algorithms and suggestions, end up being an artist themselves, by writing their own songs. People who want to go to some place to see better sunsets, don't make a whole goddamn place, but they make sure that whatever place they are at, it's better than what algorithms have suggested them.

The connections people have with one another have also been digitised. I think that is the easiest and the most convenient thing for the humans to have.

Celebrate the Unfiltered You

Think about the last photo you posted online. How many times did you retake it before choosing the one that looked "just right"? Maybe you adjusted the lighting, made sure the background was spotless, added a filter, crafted the perfect caption all to make it feel effortless, even if it wasn't. This is the quiet performance we've all become part of. Not out of vanity, but because we know the algorithm favours what's polished, popular, and perfect. We learn to post what performs well instead of what's real, sacrificing authenticity in the pursuit of unattainable perfection.

Let's build an algorithm that values authenticity over perfection.

Post with purpose, not pressure. Ask yourself: Does this reflect my truth? Does it add value or inspire? Before you browse to find the perfect caption, pause for a moment. Reflect on what you noticed, felt, or learned in that moment. Let that be your caption. Curate your feed to follow accounts that inspire authenticity and positivity rather than perfection.

Shop the Need, Not the Mood

You mention a product in passing through a call or message, and the algorithm floods your feed with thousands of advertisements. Algorithms often trigger impulsive buying through personalized, timely suggestions. The constant repetition of ads, endorsements, and “must have” items makes products feel familiar and urgent. Before you even realize it’s unnecessary, you’re already being urged into buying it. The algorithm isn’t just selling products, it’s selling the illusion of belonging, pressure to fit in. And we buy it, over and over.

Rewire the personal algorithm to prioritize needs over impulses.

Unfollow influencers, brands, or creators that push constant product placements or unrealistic lifestyles. Follow those who promote mindfulness, sustainability, or financial well-being. Create a 72-hour rule before buying anything non-essential. Give yourself time to reflect: *Do I truly need this, or am I being emotionally triggered to want it?* You’ll be surprised to find how many things no longer feel necessary after just a few days. At the end of each month, review your purchases. Which ones were truly useful? Which were emotional or impulsive? Reflect without shame, this is about awareness not guilt.

Reclaiming your attention, your choices, and your values isn’t just achievable – it’s a transformative act of power. Let the quiet rebellion reshape how you show up in the world.

Because the greatest discoveries aren't coded but are curious.

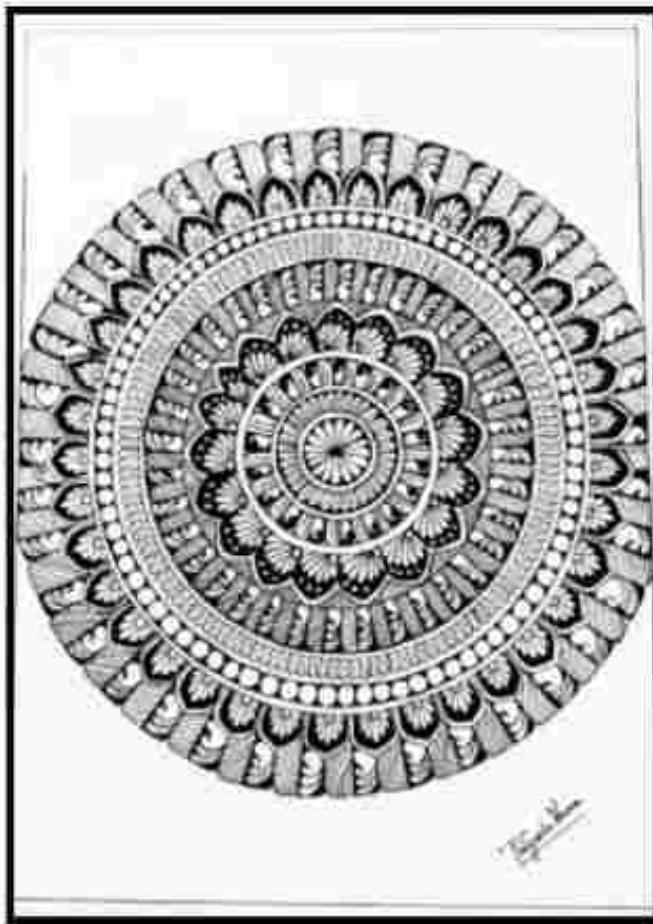

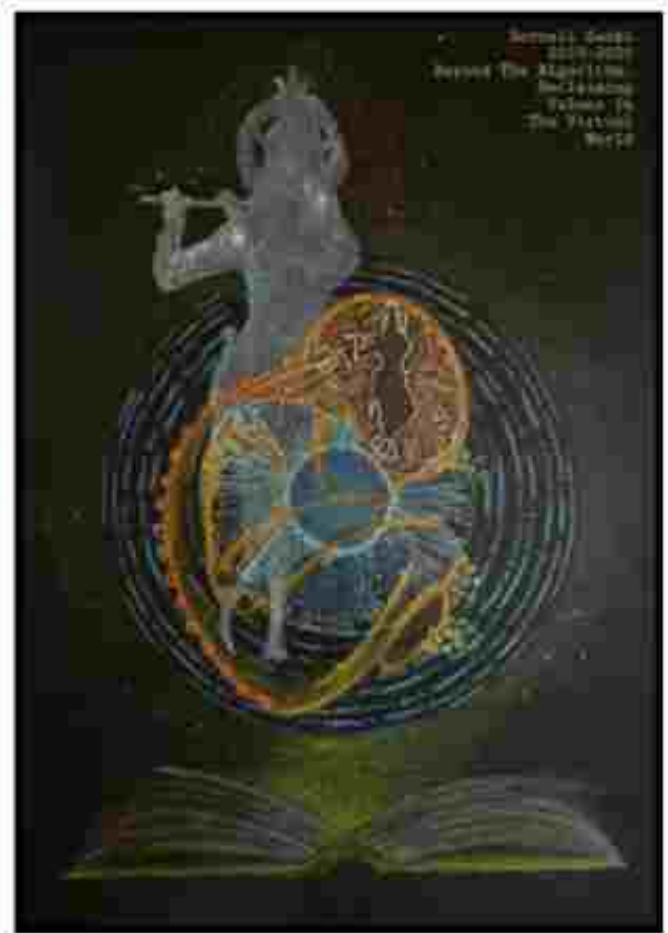

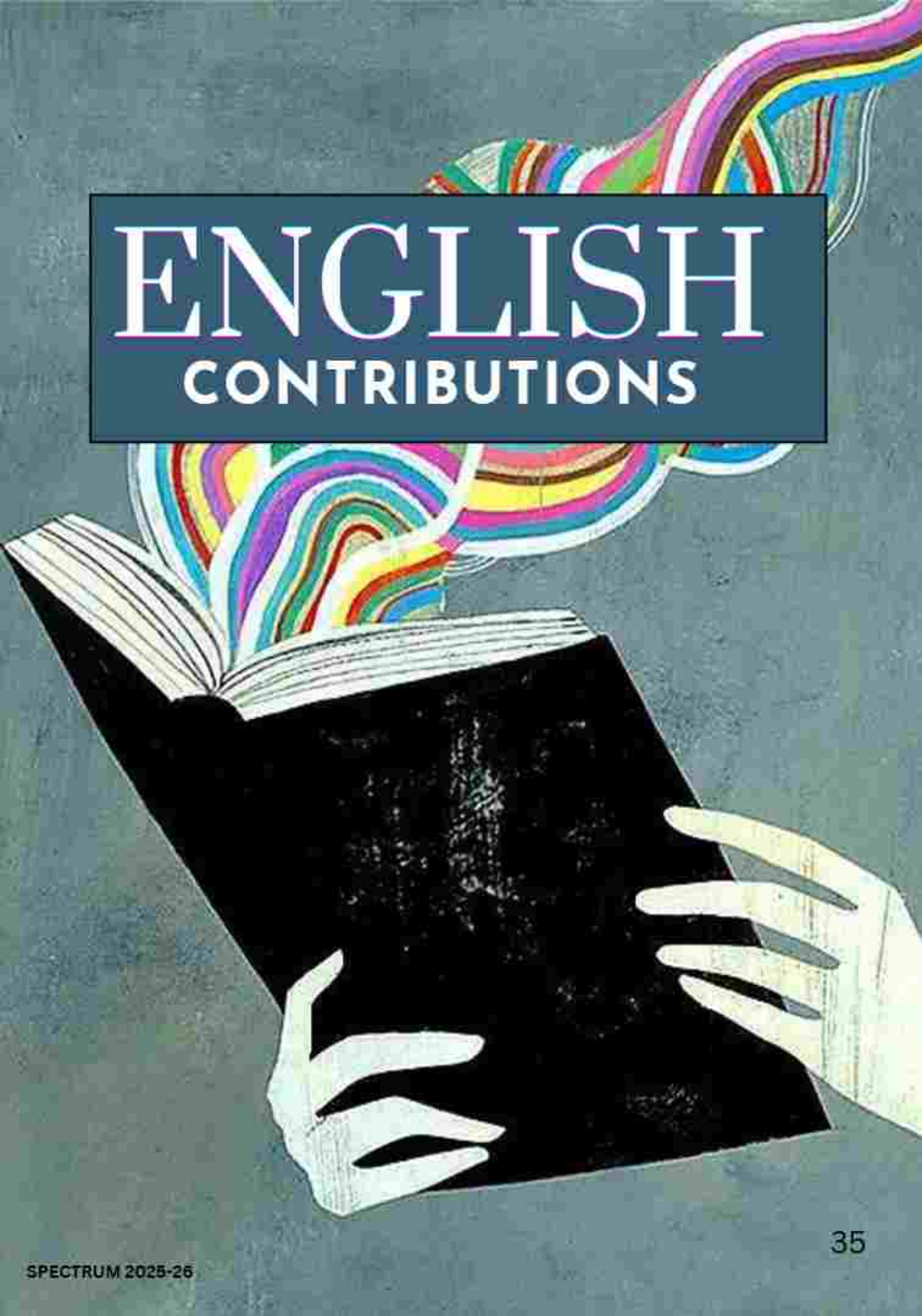

According to a recent Oxford Internet Institute survey, nearly 78% of the content consumed by teenagers is algorithmically recommended rather than personally searched. A study by Microsoft recorded a drop in average attention span from 12 seconds (in 2000) to just 8 seconds today. The impact goes far beyond distraction; it alters how we connect with ourselves and one another.

Obsessed with trends, likes, and viral sounds, we often forget to listen to our inner voice. Authenticity is replaced by performance. Decisions are driven by what is popular, not by what is meaningful. Spending hours with virtual suggestions, we risk letting go of real-world values — patience, resilience, honesty, kindness, and depth.

Observations from Daily Life

In classrooms, students may know the latest TikTok audio by heart, yet struggle to focus through a 20-minute lecture. At dining tables, families sit together — but each person's attention is trapped in a separate digital universe. In workplaces, creativity is increasingly dictated by "what the algorithm likes," not by original thought.

Behind this lies a silent reality: algorithms are mathematical systems designed by corporations, not by conscience.

The more time we give them, the more they shape our preferences — forming a loop where

we think we are choosing, but in truth, we are being chosen.

Reclaiming Human Values

- However, all is not lost. Technology is a tool and tools work best when humans remain in control. Some simple acts can help us reclaim agency:
- **Mindful Consumption:** Choose consciously what you read, watch, and share.
- **Digital Detox:** Allow your mind moments of calm where no device is present.
- **Human Engagement:** Spend time offline — building conversations, observing life, and nurturing patience.
- **Value-Based Presence:** Prioritise content that educates, enriches or inspires over what merely entertains.

Conclusion

As we move further into this virtual age, algorithms will only become more powerful. The real challenge is not to escape them, but to rise above them. When our values are clear, no machine can mislead our direction. It is time to remember that the brightest screen cannot replace a thinking mind and a feeling heart. Beyond the algorithm lies the power of being truly human — and in that humanity, the future still belongs to us.

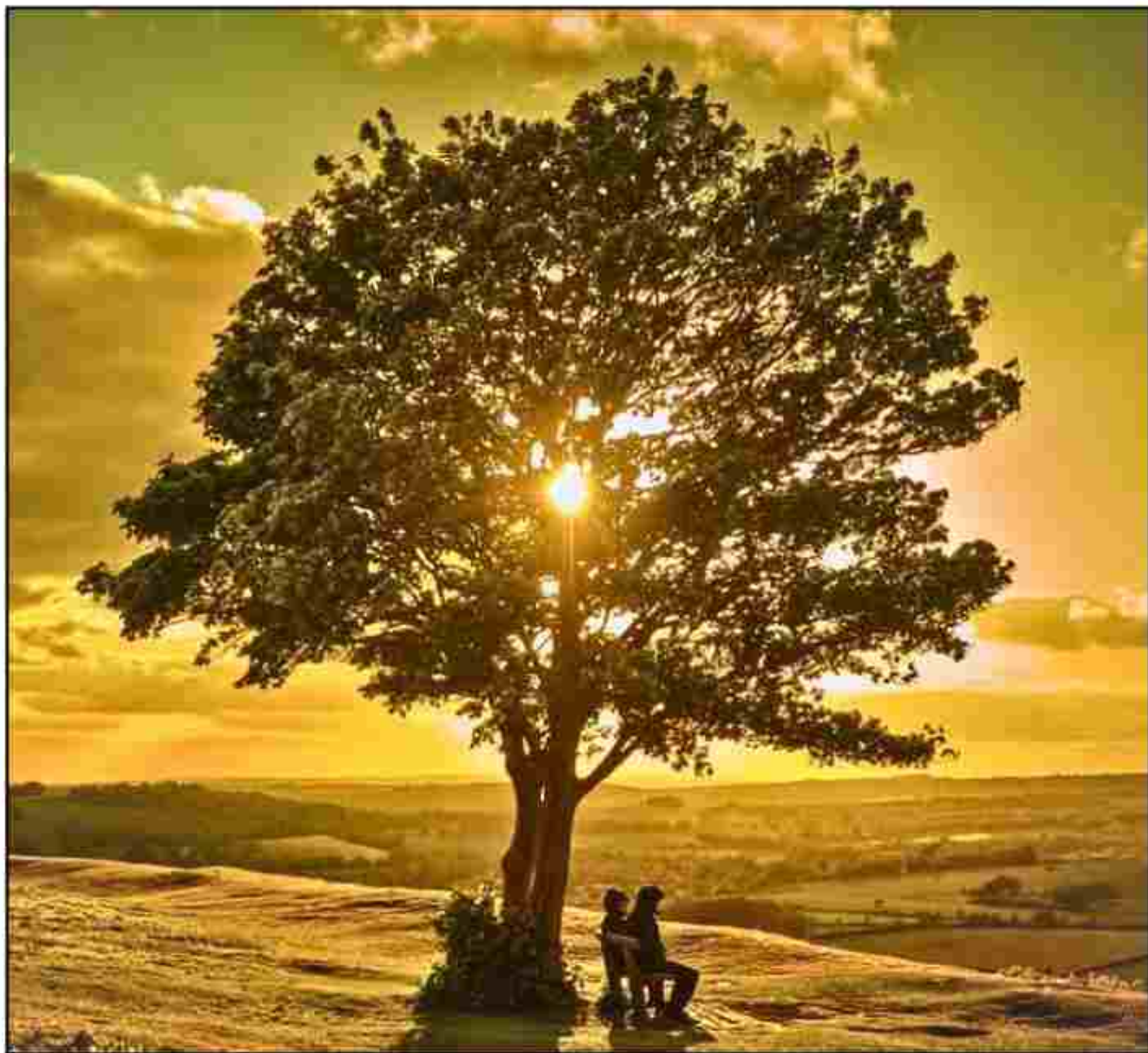

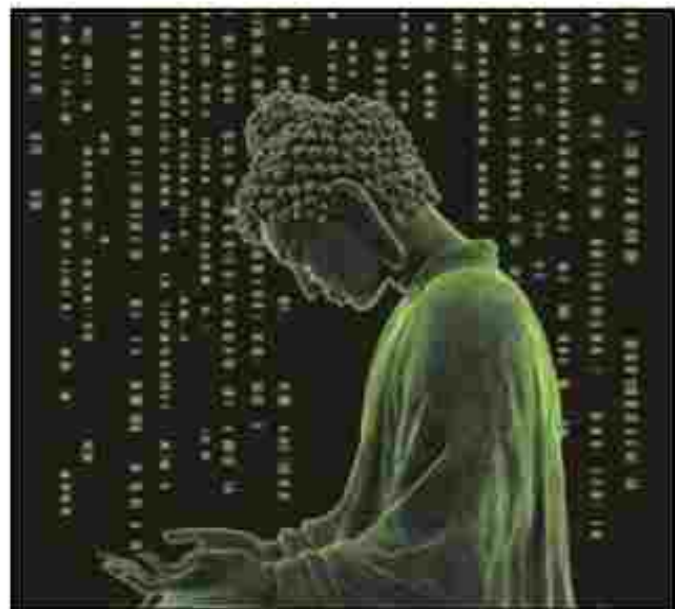


“BEYOND THE ALGORITHM”

She reminded her peers that beyond every code, every program, and every screen lies the essence of being human, the courage to ask, to think, and to choose. 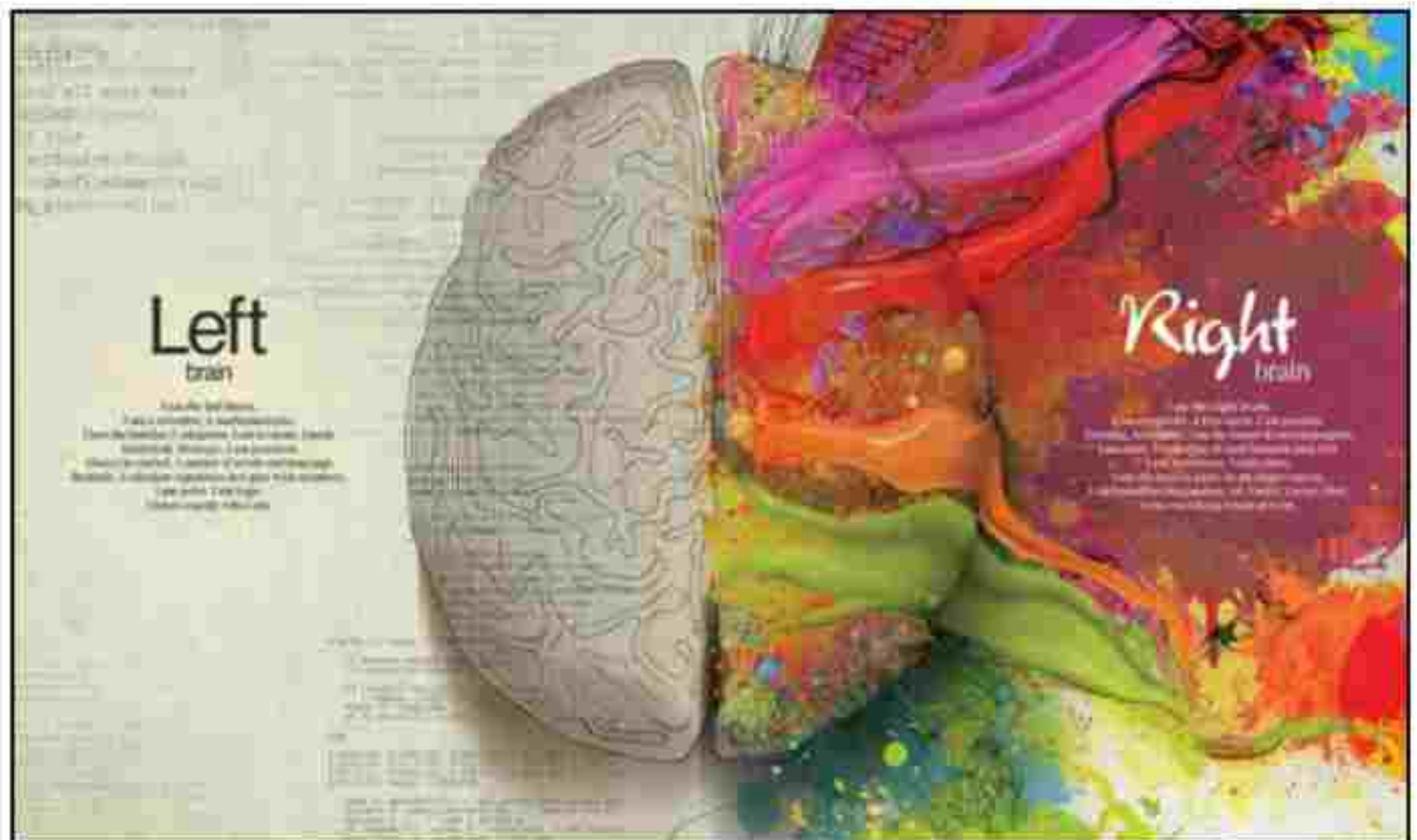

Beyond the algorithm, there is us—and that is where our real power lies.

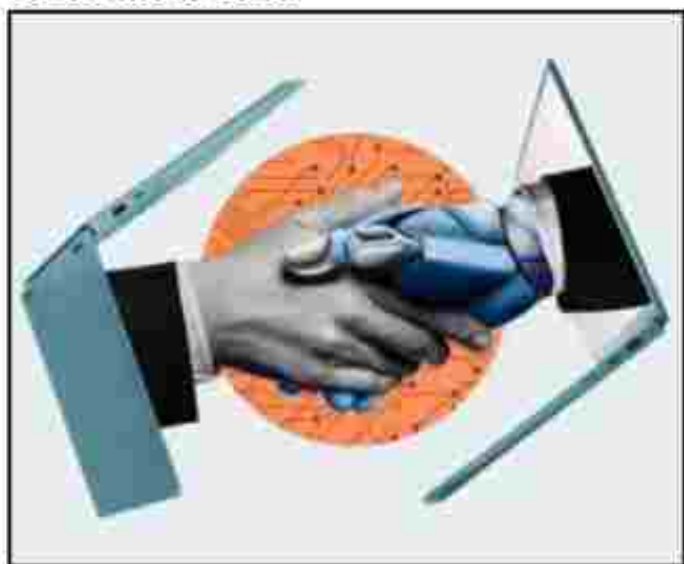


"THE FIGHT TO BE WISER AND NOT JUST WIRED"

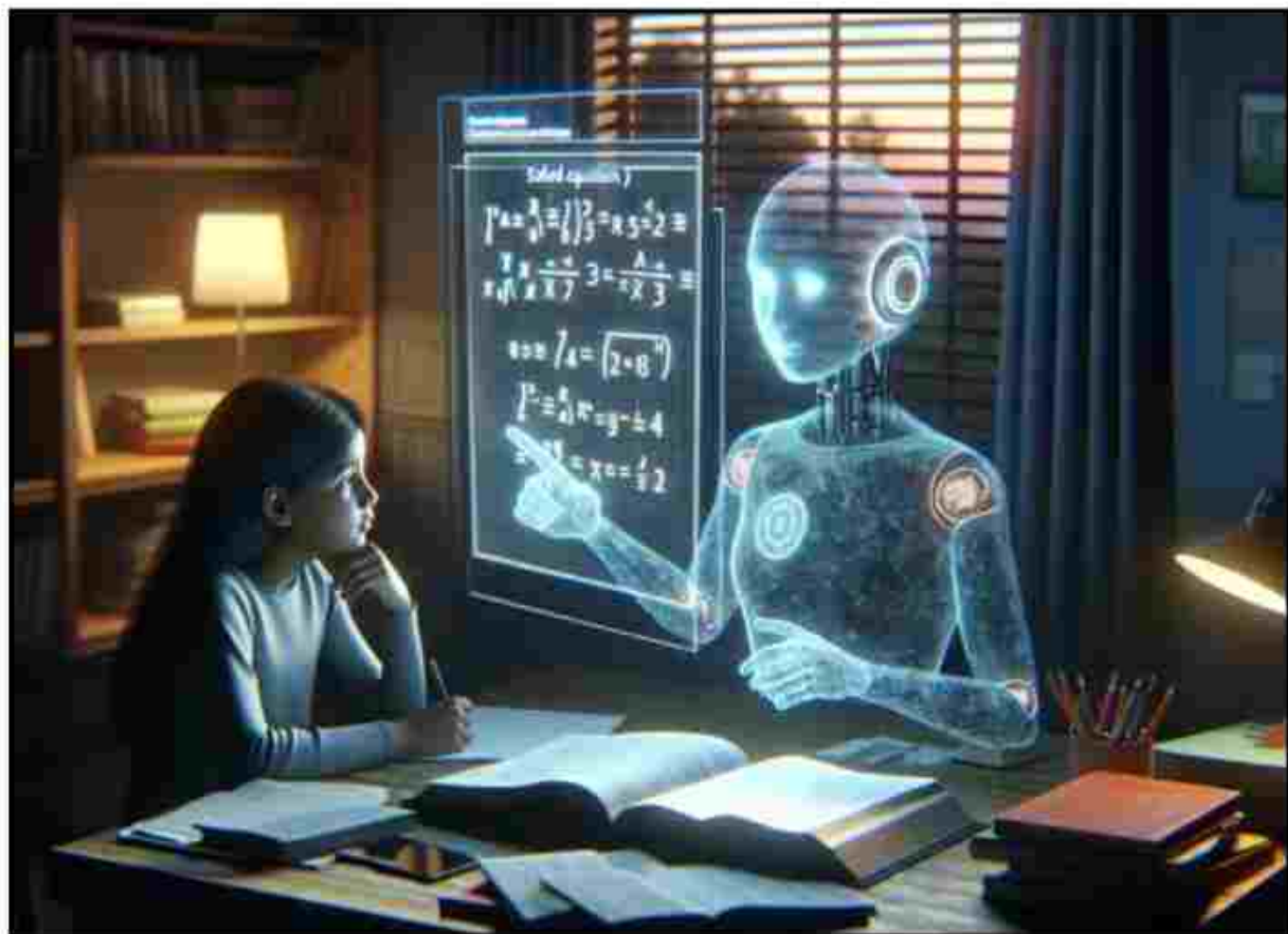

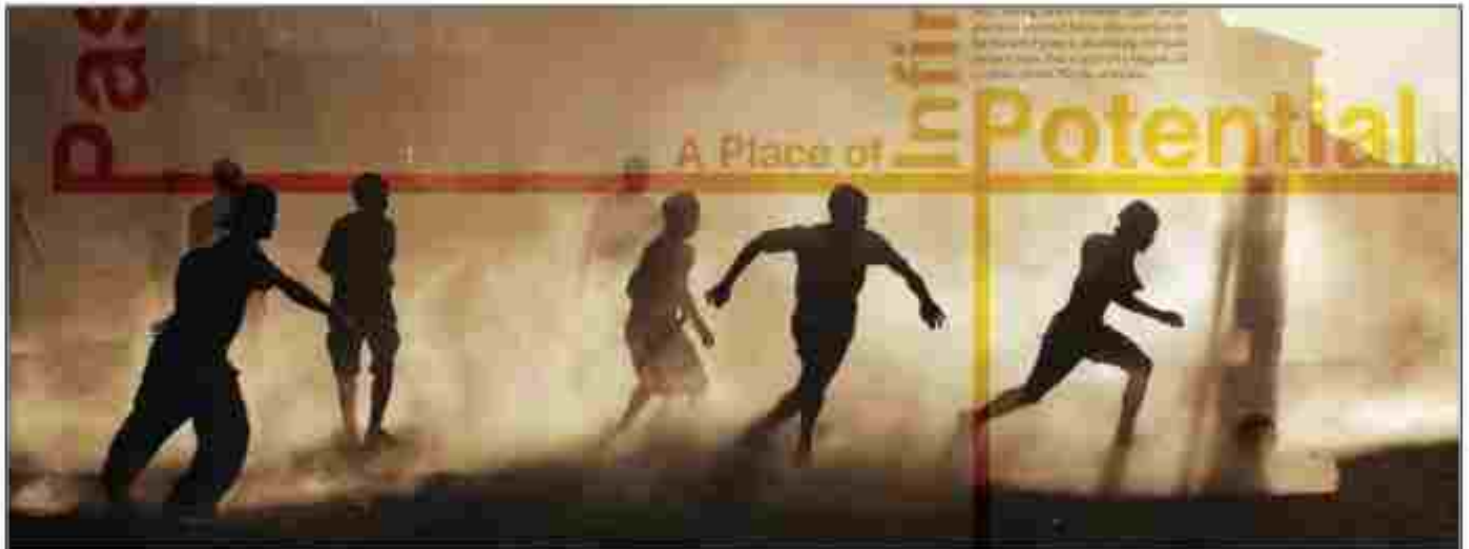

Moulding me into something worse and worse.

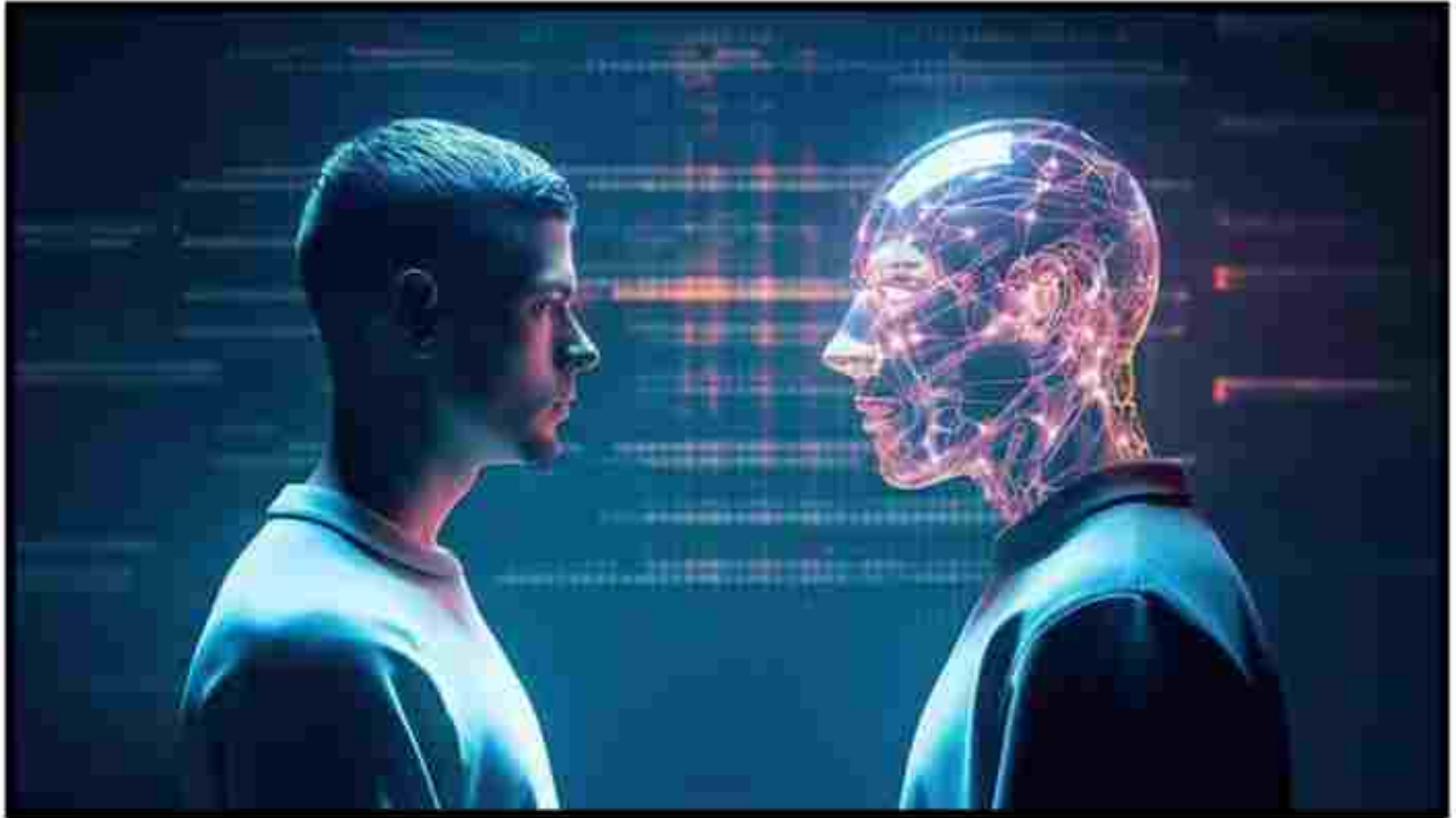

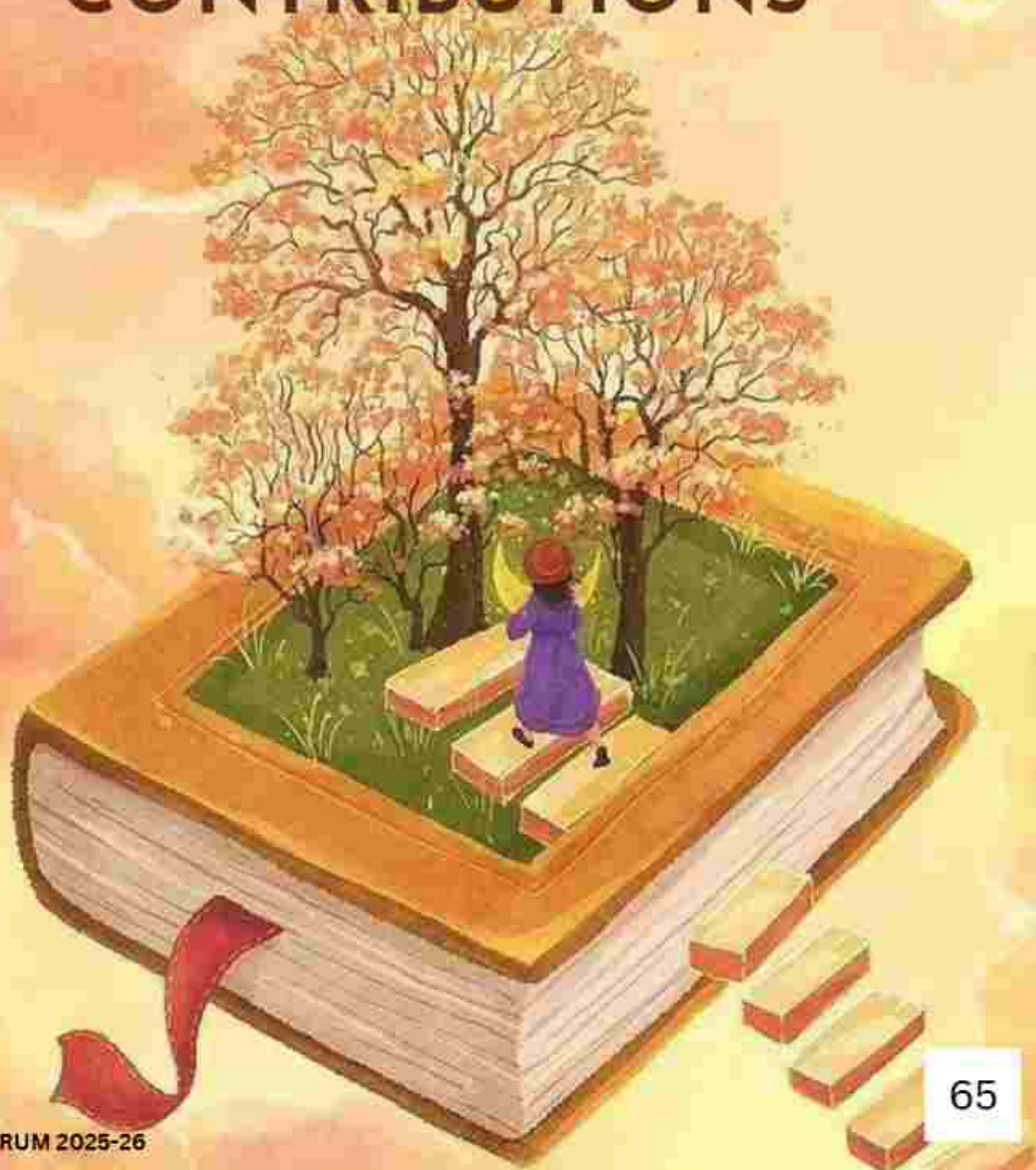

समाज माध्यम आणि डिजिटल साधनांचे अनेक फायदे आहेत. हे आपल्याला एकमेकांशी जोडून ठेवते, नातेसंबंध दृढ करतो, माहिती त्वरीत मिळवता येते आणि शिक्षण व व्यवसायासाठी नवीन संधी निर्माण करतो. ऑनलाइन वर्ग, डिजिटल पुस्तके, ई-बँकिंग यामुळे जीवन अधिक सोपे झाले आहे. तसेच लोक आपली सर्जनशीलता वाढवू शकतात, नवीन कल्पना मांडू शकतात आणि जगासमोर आपली ओळख निर्माण करू शकतात.





मात्र डिजिटल माध्यमांचा अतिवापर काही त्रासदायक परिणामदेखील देतो. समाज माध्यमांवर जास्त वेळ घालवल्यामुळे प्रत्यक्ष संवाद कमी होतो, नात्यांमधील आत्मीयता हरवते आणि लोक एकमेकांपासून दूर जातात. खोटी माहिती, अफवा किंवा भ्रामक बातम्या जलद पसरल्याने समाजात गैरसमज आणि तणाव निर्माण होतो. व्यावसायिक नातेसंबंध बिघडतात आणि मानसिक आरोग्यावरही परिणाम होतो.

संवादात अडथळे येण्याची कारणे विविध आहेत. भाषा न समजणे, सांस्कृतिक फरक, डिजिटल नेटवर्कची अडचण किंवा नीट ऐकण्याचा अभाव यामुळे संवाद अपूर्ण राहतो. त्यामुळे योग्य संवादासाठी सोपी आणि नम्र भाषा वापरणे, समोरच्याचे बोलणे लक्षपूर्वक ऐकणे, भावनांचा आदर करणे, माहितीची पडताळणी करणे आणि डिजिटल साधनांचा मर्यादित वापर करणे गरजेचे आहे.

भविष्यात संवाद अधिक प्रगत आणि प्रभावी होणार आहे. कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता, आभासी वास्तव, रोबोटिक तंत्रज्ञान यामुळे संवाद जलद, सुस्पष्ट आणि सुलभ होईल. लोक फक्त मजकूर किंवा आवाजाने नव्हे, तर व्हर्च्युअल माध्यमातूनही एकमेकांशी जोडले (आज पेक्षाही जास्त प्रमाणात) जातील. शिक्षण, आरोग्य, व्यवसाय आणि सामाजिक क्षेत्रांत त्याचा मोठा फायदा होईल.

मात्र, तंत्रज्ञान कितीही पुढे गेले तरी संवादाचं खरं सौंदर्य मानवी चेहरा, भावनिक जवळीक, आत्मीयता आणि विश्वास यांत आहे. खऱ्या भावना व्यक्त करण्याची क्षमता, एकमेकांना समजून घेणे आणि विश्वास निर्माण करणे हाच संवादाचा मुख्य उद्देश आहे.

शेवटी असे म्हणता येईल की, डिजिटल युगात तंत्रज्ञानाने आपले जीवन सुलभ केले आहे, पण त्याच्या सोबत मानवी मूल्ये जापणे, नैतिकता ठेवणे आणि प्रामाणिक संवाद साधणे गरजेचे आहे. संवादाशिवाय जीवन अपूर्ण आहे. खऱ्या भावना, माणुसकी, विश्वास आणि आत्मीयतेतच संवादाचं खरं सामर्थ्य दडलेलं आहे.

समाज माध्यम म्हणजे एक प्रकारे इंटरनेटच्या माध्यमातून चालणारा संवादाचा प्रकार. या माध्यमातून लोक एकमेकांशी बोलतात, विचारांची, माहितीची देवाणघेवाण करतात आणि नवीन गोष्टी शिकतात. आज जगभरातील सुमारे ४.७ अब्ज लोक समाज माध्यमांचा वापर करत आहेत. यावरून समजते की, हे केवळ एक साधन नाही, तर आधुनिक जीवनाचा अविभाज्य भाग बनले आहे.

समाज माध्यमाचे अनेक फायदे आहेत. हे आपल्याला लोकांशी जोडून ठेवते, नातेसंबंध दृढ करते, फोटो, व्हिडिओ आणि फाइल्स सहज एकमेकांना पाठवता येतात. व्यवसायासाठी हे खूप उपयुक्त ठरते; आपला ब्रँड तयार करता येतो, लोकप्रियता वाढवता येते. दैनंदिन जगातील बातम्या व घडामोडी सहज मिळतात. तसेच शिक्षणासाठी, नवनवीन कल्पना शोधण्यासाठी आणि सर्जनशीलता वाढवण्यासाठी समाज माध्यमे उपयोगी ठरतात.

पण याचे काही तोटेही आहेत. समाज माध्यमांचा जास्त वापर लोकांमध्ये प्रत्यक्ष संवाद कमी करतो. भावनिक जवळीक कमी होते, समोरासमोर बोलण्याची कौशल्ये कमी होतात. काहींना समाज

माध्यमाचे व्यसन लागते, ते कुटुंबापासून दूर जातात. विद्यार्थी विचलित होतात आणि अभ्यासावर परिणाम होतो. याशिवाय चुकीची माहिती, अफवा किंवा भ्रामक पोस्ट समाजात गोंधळ निर्माण करू शकतात, तरीही समाज माध्यम पूर्णतः नकारात्मक नाही.

योग्य प्रकारे वापरल्यास लोकांना त्यांचे विचार व कल्पना जगासमोर मांडण्याची संधी मिळते. डिजिटल मार्केटिंगमध्ये याची भूमिकाही महत्त्वाची आहे. फेसबुक जाहिरात, यूट्यूब प्रचार, ट्विटर किंवा लिंकडइनवरील मोहीम व्यवसायाला मोठा फायदा देतात.

आजच्या घडीला फेसबुक सर्वाधिक लोकप्रिय समाज माध्यम आहे. समाज माध्यम सहा प्रकारचे आहेत. सोशल नेटवर्किंग, बुकमार्किंग, सोशल न्यूज, मीडिया शेअरिंग, मायक्रोब्लॉगिंग आणि ऑनलाइन फोरम. या सर्व प्रकारांचा वापर आपल्या जीवनाचा अविभाज्य भाग बनला आहे.

डिजिटल आणि अल्गोरिदम आधारित या युगातही आपल्याला मानवी मूल्ये, नैतिकता आणि प्रामाणिकतेवर लक्ष ठेवणे फार गरजेचे आहे. समाज माध्यम योग्य मर्यादित आणि विवेकीपणे वापरल्यास हे आपले जीवन समृद्ध करेल, पण अतिरेक झाल्यास ते मानवी नातेसंबंध आणि मानसिक आरोग्यास हानी पोहोचवू शकते. म्हणूनच, समाज माध्यमाचा वापर संतुलित, सजग आणि जबाबदारीने करणे आवश्यक आहे.

“Beyond the Algorithm: Reclaiming Values in a Virtual World” என்ற தலைப்பு நமக்கு நினைவூட்டுவது, எவ்வளவு திறமையானதாக இருந்தாலும் தொழில்நுட்பம் மனிதனின் உணர்வுகளை மாற்ற முடியாது என்பதே ஆல்கொரிதம்கள் தரவு, முறை, சாத்தியக்கூறுகளின் மீது இயங்குகின்றன. ஆனால் அவற்றில் கருணை, பரிவு, நெறிமுறை உணர்வு போன்றவை கிடையாது. ஒரு செயற்கை உரையாடல் மென்பொருள் நம்மை பின்பற்றி பேசலாம், ஆனால் உண்மையான தோழமையின் ஆறுதலை அது உணர முடியாது. ஆபத்து செயற்கை நுண்ணறிவில்லை; அதை மறைமுகமாக நம் வாழ்வின் எல்லைகளைக்



அப்படியென்றால் ஆல்கொரிதமைக் கடந்து நாம் எப்படி செல்ல முடியும்? பதில் சமநிலையில்தான் உள்ளது. AI நமக்கான கருவியாக இருக்க வேண்டும், எஜமானனாக அல்ல. தொழில்நுட்பம் உடனடி நன்மைகளை அளிக்கும்போது சவு, அது வெளிப்படைத்தன்மை, தனியுரிமை, சமத்துவம் போன்ற மதிப்புகளை காக்கும் வகையில் பயன்படுத்தப்பட வேண்டும். அதேசமயம், ஒவ்வொரு நபரும் டிஜிட்டல் விழிப்புணர்வை வளர்த்துக் கொள்ள வேண்டும். தாங்கள் ஆன்லைனில் காண்பதை ஆராய வேண்டும், விழிப்புணர்வுடன் தேர்வுகளை செய்ய வேண்டும், உண்மைத்தன்மையை ஆல்கொரிதமால் நிர்ணயிக்கப்படும் புகழுக்கு மேலாக மதிக்க வேண்டும்.

இறுதியில், AI மனிதன் உருவாக்கியதும், மனிதன் பயன்படுத்தியதும் தான். பேராசையுடன் அணுகினால் அது அநீதி ஆழ்த்தும்; பரிஷடன் அணுகினால் அது மனித குலத்தை உயர்த்தும். ஆல்கொரிதம்கள் ஆளும் மெய்நிகர் உலகில், இயந்திரங்கள் எப்போதும் பின்பற்ற முடியாத பண்புகள் அன்பு, நீதி, படைப்பாற்றல், கருணை இவையே நம்மை உண்மையில் முன்னேற்றும் மதிப்புகள்

கட்டுப்படுத்த அனுமதிப்பதில்தான் இருக்கிறது. ஒரு இயந்திரத்தின் கணிப்பு அரசியல் தேர்தலைத் தாக்கலாம், சமூக கருத்துக்களை மாற்றலாம், வேலை வாய்ப்புகளைக் கட்டுப்படுத்தலாம். அப்படியான உலகில், மனித மதிப்புகளை மீட்டெடுப்பது அவசியமாகிறது.

મદદરૂપ બની રહી છે. આ એપ્સ 24/7 ઉપલબ્ધ હોય છે, અને લોકો જ્યારે માનસિક તણાવ કે ચિંતા અનુભવે ત્યારે તાત્કાલિક સપોર્ટ મેળવી શકે છે. આ ટેકનોલોજી, ખાસ કરીને જે લોકો એકલા હોય કે તાત્કાલિક મદદની જરૂર હોય તેમના માટે ખૂબ જ ફાયદાકારક સાબિત થાય છે.

AI એ માણસની લાગણીઓને સમજવા અને તેનું વિશ્લેષણ કરવા માટે વિકસાવવામાં આવી છે. ઉદાહરણ તરીકે, AI કેમેરા અને સેન્સર્સ, માણસના ચહેરાના હાવભાવ અને અવાજના ટોન પરથી તેની લાગણીઓને ઓળખી શકે છે. આ ટેકનોલોજીનો ઉપયોગ માર્કેટિંગ, કસ્ટમર સર્વિસ, અને સુરક્ષાના ક્ષેત્રમાં થાય છે. જોકે, આ ટેકનોલોજીથી લાગણીઓનું યાંત્રિકરણ (Mechanization) થવાનું જોખમ રહેલું છે. જ્યારે લાગણીઓને માત્ર ડેટા તરીકે જોવામાં આવે છે, ત્યારે તેની પાછળની માનવીયતા અને ગહનતા ઓછી થઈ શકે છે.

આનાથી લોકો પોતાની લાગણીઓને સમજવાને બદલે માત્ર ટેકનોલોજી પર આધાર રાખવાનું શરૂ કરી શકે છે.

AI એ આપણા જીવનનો એક અભિન્ન ભાગ બની ગયું છે, અને તેની અસર માનવ ભાવનાઓ પર સકારાત્મક અને નકારાત્મક બંને રીતે થઈ રહી છે. AI કનેક્ટિવિટી અને સપોર્ટ પૂરો પાડી શકે છે, પરંતુ તેનાથી એકલતા અને સપાટી પરના સંબંધોનું જોખમ પણ રહેલું છે. આપણે AI નો ઉપયોગ સમજદારીપૂર્વક કરવો જોઈએ. ટેકનોલોજીનો ઉપયોગ આપણા જીવનને સરળ બનાવવા માટે કરવો, પરંતુ વાસ્તવિક સંબંધો, લાગણીઓ, અને માનવતાને પ્રાધાન્ય આપવું ખૂબ જ જરૂરી છે. જો આપણે આ સંતુલન જાળવીશું, તો જ આપણે AI ના ફાયદાઓનો સંપૂર્ણ લાભ લઈ શકીશું અને તેના ગેરફાયદાઓથી બચી શકીશું.
